Classified	Pink		Unusual drops that typically include unique designs and greater market value.
Covert	Red		The greatest basic weapon tier in any case; extremely rare and important.
Unique (Exceedingly Rare)	Gold		Knives or Gloves. The ultimate jackpot of case opening.

The Mathematics: What Are the Real Odds?

While Valve initially kept the precise drop rates a trick, guidelines in certain areas required the company to release the official odds. The mathematics behind case openings is sobering, created primarily as a sink for virtual currency instead of a trustworthy financial investment technique.

Statistically, the possibilities for opening any provided case break down approximately as follows:

- **Mil-Spec (Blue):** ~ 79.92%
- **Restricted (Purple):** ~ 15.98%
- **Classified (Pink):** ~ 3.2%
- **Covert (Red):** ~ 0.64%
- **Special/ Knife or Gloves (Gold):** ~ 0.26%
