## Factors to Consider When Choosing a Tank Size

### 1. Fish Adult Size and Swimming Habits

It is simple to forget that the cute little 1-inch goldfish or pleco at the family pet store may turn into a 12-inch giant. Looking into the *adult* size of a types is compulsory. Furthermore, think about activity levels:

- **Active Swimmers:** Fish like Danios and Tetras require horizontal swimming space, indicating a long, shallow tank is better than a high, narrow one of the same volume.
- **Bottom Dwellers:** Species like Corydoras catfish need sufficient floor area instead of water depth.

### 2. Bioload and Stocking Capacity

"Bioload" describes the amount of biological waste a fish produces. A typical general rule for newbies is the "**One Inch of Fish Per Gallon**" rule. Nevertheless, modern-day aquarists usually consider this guideline out-of-date and undependable.

A 3-inch goldfish produces significantly more waste than a 3-inch tetra due to its diet plan and digestion system. Instead, aquarists calculate equipping levels based upon overall fish mass, purification capability, and area.

Many popular freshwater fish-- such as neon tetras, cory catfish, and baros-- are education or shoaling species. Keeping them alone causes chronic tension.

- These fish should be kept in groups of **a minimum of 6 people** of the same species.

- **Lighting:** If you prepare to keep live aquatic plants, tank height matters. Deep tanks (over 20 inches) need more powerful, specialized LED lighting fixtures so that light can penetrate down to the substrate.
