Every item drops with a specific "float worth" varying from **0.00 to 1.00**, which determines its physical wear and tear. The float is divided into 5 main wear classifications:

- **Factory New (FN):** 0.00-- 0.07 (Pristine, minimal scratches)
- **Minimal Wear (MW):** 0.07-- 0.15 (Slight blemishes, typically near edges)
- **Field-Tested (FEET):** 0.15-- 0.38 (Noticeable wear, scratches, or fading)
- **Well-Worn (WW):** 0.38-- 0.45 (Significant wear, paint chipping)
- **Battle-Scarred (BS):** 0.45-- 1.00 (Extremely used, in some cases drastically modifying the texture)

Note: Some products look great even in Battle-Scarred condition, while others are valued strictly in Factory New.

2. Item Rarity Tiers

Valve categorizes weapon surfaces into color-coded tiers based on their drop rates in cases or trade-ups.

Rarity Tier Color Code Drop Rate/ Acquisition Method **Customer Grade** White Found in weekly drops/ Base game **Industrial Grade** Light Blue Typical drops/ Low-tier case contents **Mil-Spec** Dark Blue Requirement case drops **Limited** Purple Uncommon case drops **Categorized** Pink Uncommon case drops **Covert** Red Extremely unusual case drops (Top-tier basic weapons) **Exotic/ Special** Gold Very unusual (Knives and Gloves)

Beyond float worths and rarities, 2 significant functions can drastically pump up a product's value: **Pattern Indexes** and **StatTrak™ technology**.



Pattern Templates

Many finishes use a procedural generation system where a texture design template crosses the weapon model based on a "Paint Seed" (from 1 to 1000). Depending upon the seed number, the visual appearance can change completely.

- **Case Hardened:** Famous for its blue and gold circulations. A pattern with a high portion of solid blue on top can command tens of thousands of dollars.
- **Fade:** Depending on the seed, the shift from yellow to pink to purple can vary, with "100% Fade" variants bring leading dollar.

StatTrak™ Technology

Products equipped with StatTrak™ function a small digital LCD screen connected to the weapon body that tracks the number of verified eliminates the owner makes with it. While these items drop at the very same rate as their non-StatTrak counterparts, they typically command a greater price on the Steam Community Market and third-party trading websites.

How to Acquire Them

4. **Trade-Ups:** A system where players can trade 10 products of one rarity tier for one random product of the next greater tier within the same collection.
