3. **Re-align the Door:** If tightening up does not repair the droop, loosen up the hinge screws slightly, have an assistant hold the door level at the correct height, and retighten the screws firmly.

3. Drafts and Leaks Around the Frame

If a glass outside door lets in cold air or wetness throughout a rainstorm, the weatherstripping has most likely compressed, broken, or degraded.
