How Transactions Work: Steam API and P2P Trading

In the past, CS2 gambling websites utilized bots that straight traded with gamers via Steam accounts. Today, the majority of platforms use **Peer-to-Peer (P2P) systems**.

3. The site credits the depositor's account balance once the trade is verified.

This method assists platforms prevent direct involvement in dealing with Valve's stock products while keeping the virtual economy flowing.

- **Usage Two-Factor Authentication (2FA):** Secure your Steam Guard mobile authenticator and email accounts carefully.
