How Does a Case Battle Work? Detailed

Types of Case Battle Game Modes

- **Timeless Mode:** The basic format where the highest total worth wins everything.

- **Playing "Crazy Mode" with Intent:** Because reverse battles favor low-value drops, some gamers utilize specific low-priced cases where the minimum drop is extremely small, trying to video game the analytical possibility of rolling blanks.
