Condition Name	Float Value Range	Visual Description
Factory New (FN)	0.00-- 0.07	Pristine condition with little to no noticeable scratches or use. Normally commands the greatest price.
Minimal Wear (MW)	0.07-- 0.15	Small blemishes, slight scratches, or minor paint cracking, frequently just noticeable upon close evaluation.
Field-Tested (FEET)	0.15-- 0.38	Obvious wear and tear, scratches on the body, and fading colors. This is the most typical condition.
Well-Worn (WW)	0.38-- 0.44	Significant wear, heavy scratches, and significant paint loss around the edges and high-friction areas.
Battle-Scarred (BS)	0.44-- 1.00	Exceptionally used, greatly faded, and sometimes considerably altered look. Some collectors specifically look for extreme BS drifts for a "blackimov" effect.

Beyond basic wear, some skins likewise include a **StatTrak**™ technology module, which tracks the variety of eliminates a player gets with that specific weapon, including a radiant orange digital counter to the body of the weapon.

The CS2 Skin Economy: How Value is Determined

Unlike cosmetic items in numerous other modern-day video games, CS2 skins have real-world monetary value because they are fully tradeable and marketable. Players can purchase, offer, and trade items by means of the Steam Community Market or through trusted third-party markets using genuine currency or cryptocurrencies.
