Example Cost Structure

To show the economics of a typical 10-person battle, consider a lobby that utilizes the "Gamma 2" case (\approx £ 2.30 per case). Each participant purchases one case, so the total pot is £ 23.00. The platform takes a 5% commission (£ 1.15), leaving £ 21.85 to be distributed as follows:
