Step-by-Step Guides for Common DIY Window Fixes

For those eager to roll up their sleeves, here are 3 common window repair work that most property owners can tackle.

1. Replacing Worn Weatherstripping

Breezy windows are often the outcome of flattened or missing weatherstripping.



- **Step 1:** Clean the window channel completely to remove dirt and old adhesive.
- **Step 2:** Measure the perimeter of the window sash.
- **Step 3:** Cut the brand-new weatherstripping (V-strip, foam tape, or felt) to size.
- **Step 4:** Peel and stick (or staple, depending on the material) the weatherstripping into place, making sure a tight seal when the window closes.

2. Repairing a Stuck Window

Old paint or humidity can cause wood windows to stick securely within their tracks.

- **Action 1:** Run an utility knife thoroughly around the border of the sash to break any paint seals.
- **Step 2:** Tap carefully along the frame with a wood block and a hammer to loosen the window without shattering the glass.
- **Step 3:** Once the window relocations, raise it and clear out any dirt or particles from the tracks.
- **Step 4:** Apply a silicone-based lube or paraffin wax to the tracks for smooth future operation.

3. Changing a Cracked Single-Pane Window

If a single pane of glass breaks, it can be replaced without buying a whole new window unit.

- **Step 1:** Put on durable work gloves and safety glasses. Carefully eliminate all damaged glass shards from the frame.
- **Step 2:** Scrape away the old glazing putty and get rid of the metal sparkles holding the glass in place.
- **Step 3:** Measure the opening and cut a new piece of glass (or have a hardware shop cut it) somewhat smaller sized than the opening.
- **Step 4:** Apply a fresh bed of glazing putty to the rabbet (the recess where the glass sits).
- **Step 5:** Press the glass firmly into the putty, secure it with new glazing points, and use a bevel of putty around the exterior edge. Paint once dry.

Preventive Maintenance: How to Make Your Windows Last

The very best window repair is the one you never have to make. Regular maintenance can significantly extend the life-span of windows:

- **Clean Regularly:** Wipe down tracks, frames, and glass at least two times a year to prevent dirt buildup that causes jams.
- **Examine Caulking:** Check the outside caulk around the window frames every year. Reapply exterior-grade silicone caulk if spaces or fractures appear.
- **Lube Moving Parts:** Apply a light lubricant to hinges, locks, and sliding tracks once a year.

- **Control Indoor Humidity:** Use dehumidifiers in moist locations like basements to prevent condensation and subsequent wood rot.

- **Vinyl windows:** 20 to 40 years.
- **Wood windows:** 30 to 50+ years (with appropriate maintenance).
- **Aluminum windows:** 20 to 25 years.
- **Fiberglass windows:** 50+ years.
