- **Battle-Scarred (BS):** 0.45-- 1.00 (Heavy damage, rust, or missing out on paint)

It is essential to keep in mind that not all skins are available in every wear condition. Some skins are capped and can not drop as Factory New, heavily affecting their rarity and subsequent market price.

The Steam Community Market and Player-Driven Economy
