

Elm Grove does not try to be a place it is not. That is part of its appeal. Tucked into Waukesha County with a compact footprint and a distinctly residential character, the village has long balanced old-community stability with the practical demands of modern suburban life. People move here for a reason that is easy to understand after a short drive through its neighborhoods: Elm Grove feels cared for.
