

Rekeying locks is often the quiet middle ground between doing nothing and replacing every piece of hardware on the door. 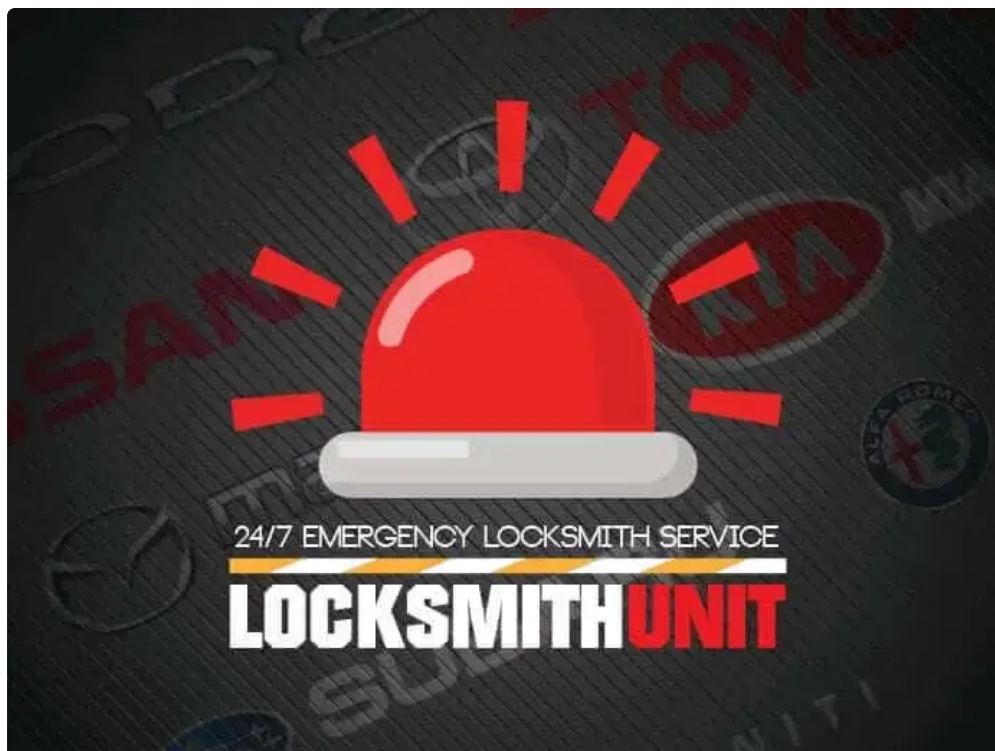
Why on-site work is such a practical fit
