#### 2. Fixing Sagging or Misaligned Hinged Glass Doors

Hinged glass doors-- such as interior glass doors or patio area French doors-- regularly experience gravity. The heavy glass panel puts enormous strain on the hinges, causing the door to droop and scrape versus the limit.

- **Step 1: Inspect the Hinges**Open the door and examine the screws on all hinges. Frequently, a sagging door is merely brought on by loose hinge screws pulling away from the door frame.
- **Action 2: Tighten or Replace Screws**Tighten up any loose screws. - **Step 3: Adjust Hinge Tension or Position**If tightening up the screws does not deal with the droop, adjust the specific change screws found on modern adjustable hinges, or use a shim behind the bottom hinge to push the door back into alignment.

### 3. Replacing Worn Weatherstripping

If a glass door lets in cold drafts during winter or permits conditioned air to escape in the summer, the weatherstripping has most likely degraded.

- **Action 1: Remove Old Weatherstripping**Peel away the old rubber, vinyl, or felt weatherstripping from the door frame or the edge of the door. Utilize a putty knife to scrape away any remaining adhesive residue.
- **Action 2: Clean the Surface**Clean down the application location with rubbing alcohol to ensure a clean, dust-free surface area for the new adhesive.
- **Action 3: Install the New Material**Procedure the boundary of the door frame and cut the new weatherstripping to size. Press firmly into place, making sure a tight seal when the door is closed without making it excessively challenging to lock.

Replacing just the glass pane is generally more affordable than replacing the entire door unit, but custom sizes and specialized safety glass can increase product and labor costs.
