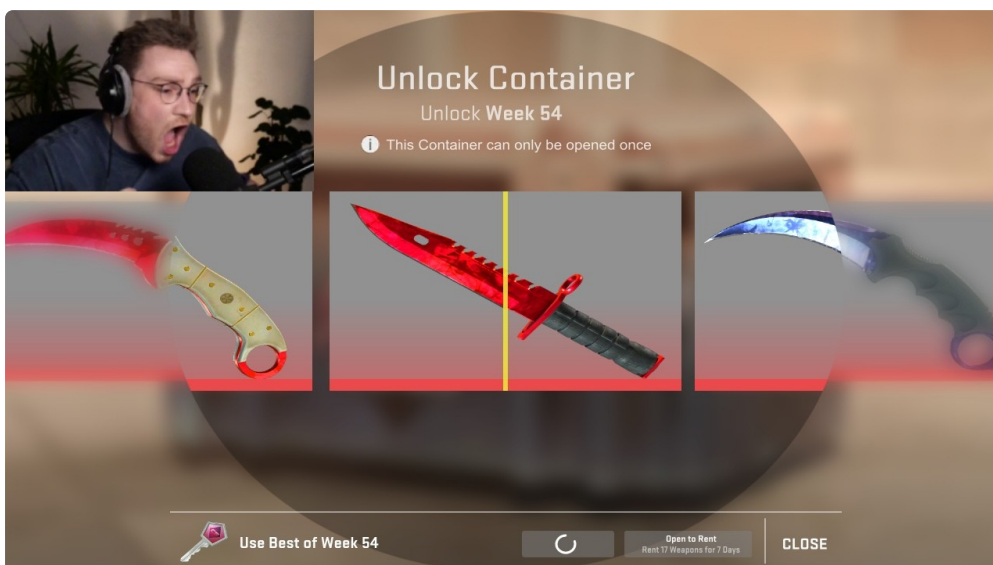


CS: GO Case Sites: The Ultimate Guide to Opening Virtual Loot Boxes in Counter-Strike

Security and Legal Considerations

Age Restrictions

Most jurisdictions require users to be at least 18 years of ages (or 21 in the United States) to participate in real-money betting. Reliable case websites enforce this by asking for ID confirmation throughout the deposit process.

Licensing and Regulation

Case sites operate in a grey area of online betting law. Responsible Play

- **Set a spending plan**-- Decide beforehand how much you want to spend and never exceed it.
