- **Celebratory Major Championship Packages:** Tied to CS: GO Majors (e.g., Katowice, Cologne, Stockholm), these do not need keys to open however instead require Viewer Passes and match coins.
- **Operation Cases:** Released during particular limited-time operations. When the operation ends, these cases sign up with the unusual drop pool.

3. **Prisma Case:** Known for including vibrant skins like the M4A4|Emperor along with a budget-friendly set of knife finishes.
4. **Operation Breakout Weapon Case:** Famously includes the Butterfly Knife, among the most popular knife designs in the video game's history, driving its sustained high market worth.

Best Practices for Interacting with the Case Economy

Since opening cases is essentially a type of gaming, community veterans and monetary analysts alike advise approaching the system with rigorous guidelines.

- **Deal With Cases as Entertainment, Not Investment:** Expect to lose money on average when opening cases. Just invest what you want to totally cross out.

5. How do I get free cases?

Players can earn as much as a few weapon cases each week simply by using official Valve matchmaking servers and leveling up their profile rank (usually limited to the very first weekly drop reset). Additionally, active operation tokens or watching official Major competition streams linked to a Steam account can yield celebratory drops.
