

Start at the top edge

Look at any house after dark and the outline you pick out first is the roof edge. It is the one line that runs the whole width of the house, and it has open sky behind it, which is why light on it reads from a distance. Light that line and the building reads as a shape rather than a dark mass. That is the reason permanent systems live at the roof edge, and why one line up there outperforms a dozen fixtures at ground level. It is the highest impact run on the building, for what it costs to install.

What roofline lighting is made of

Roofline lighting is a color matched aluminum channel with LEDs set into it, fastened along the roof edge and left there. That channel is doing double duty, carrying the LEDs and keeping the daytime look clean. Matched to the trim, it reads as part of the house at noon.

Where the run goes

Every plan begins at the main roofline, and grows from there. After the main line come the gables, the dormers and the porch, added only where it adds something. Outline everything and the house reads flat, which is the usual mistake. The run itself is worth looking at closely on a finished job, because a straight line held over a long span is harder than it looks.

Daylight is half the job

The hardware does not come down, so the daytime look is part of the product. That is why the color match matters more than it sounds. Tight to the line, color matched, wire tucked: that is a clean install.

What you do with it once it is up

Once the run is in, the rest is what you set it to. Plain white most nights, color when there is a reason, on a timer so nobody has to remember. The setting that gets the most hours is almost always the plain one, which is not what most buyers expect going in.

What makes one roofline cost more than another

Rooflines are not comparable by square footage. Length matters less than complexity. Complexity is what drives it: straight runs are quick, and every corner, peak and level change adds work. Two stories is a different day than one.

Does it attach to the gutter?

The gutter is the first thing people point at. A permanent channel is a different arrangement. That distinction matters because gutters move, sag and get replaced, and hardware attached to one goes wherever it goes.

How to find out what your house needs

No two rooflines have the same shape, so the plan gets drawn after [permanent lighting installation](#) somebody looks at yours. What is permanent outdoor lighting?

Permanent outdoor lighting is a fixed LED system installed along a building's roofline, eaves and architectural lines and left in place all year. The LEDs sit in a track that is color matched to the trim, and the system is controlled from a smartphone app. It replaces the seasonal strands that go up and come down each year.

Are the lights noticeable during the day?

The track is color matched to the trim or fascia and mounted tight along the edge of the roofline, so it is designed to stay discreet in daylight and read as part of the house rather than as decoration.

Does EverCrest Lighting install Christmas lights?
