- **Keep an eye out for Site Fees:** Different platforms take a small percentage (rake) from the overall pot or charge transaction charges. Check out the regards to service thoroughly.
- **Diversify Your Lobbies:** Instead of blowing your whole bankroll on one huge 4-player battle, break your funds into smaller sized chunks to extend your playtime and variance.

Threats and Considerations
