For **ants**, **cockroaches**, and **rodents**, the timing should reflect the level of infestation, the source of the problem, and whether the home needs **exclusion** work to stop future entry. A one-time spray seldom solves the root cause if entry points remain open or sanitation issues continue.

How often should ants be treated in Hamilton?

Ant control in Hamilton often needs to be seasonal, but the exact timing depends on species and where ants are entering. For many homes, a spring inspection followed by treatment as needed is enough. If you're seeing live roaches during the day, droppings, egg cases, or a persistent odour, those are clear signs that the issue is more advanced. In that case, the service interval should be shorter, and the plan should include monitoring until pest activity is fully under control.

How often is rodent control needed?

Rodent control is often the most urgent when there are active **mice** or **rats** in the home. Unlike some seasonal pests, rodents can become a year-round problem once they find warmth, food, and shelter indoors. In Hamilton homes, especially those with older construction, the need for follow-up may be more regular because of structural openings and changing conditions around the foundation.

A common first step is usually a home inspection to determine where rodents are entering. **Sealing access routes** is essential: filling holes, reinforcing weak spots, and closing gaps around pipes, vents, doors, and utility lines.
