- **Case Opening:** Simulates the in-game case opening experience but typically with significantly better (or a minimum of transparently stated) chances than the official Valve cases.

- **Provably Fair Algorithms:** Reputable sites utilize cryptographic "provably fair" systems, allowing users to verify that game results are truly random and not controlled by the house. Unregulated sites, nevertheless, might rig games.
