1. **Note the Error Message:** Does the game crash to desktop (CTD) quietly, or does it show a particular mistake code (like engine.dll or memory allotment mistakes)?
2. **Inspect System Temperatures:** Overheating CPUs and GPUs will instantly throttle or shut down procedures to prevent irreversible hardware damage.
3. **Confirm Recent Changes:** Did the crash start taking place right away after a Windows upgrade, a graphics driver upgrade, or the installation of new peripherals?

- **AMD Users:** Open AMD Software: Adrenalin Edition, browse to *Checking for Updates*, and set up the recommended software plan.

3. Change Launch Options

4. Disable Fullscreen Optimizations

- **Step 1:** Navigate to the video game setup directory site (generally C: \ Program Files (x86)\ Steam \ steamapps \ typical \ Counter-Strike Global Offensive).
- **Action 2:** Locate the main executable file (csgo.exe).
- **Step 3:** Right-click the file and select **Properties**.
- **Step 4:** Go to the **Compatibility** tab.
- **Step 5:** Check the box for **Disable fullscreen optimizations**.

- **Step 6:** Click *Apply* and *OKAY*.

Advanced Troubleshooting

If basic software fixes fail to resolve the crashing concern, the problem may lie much deeper within the os or hardware setup.

Managing Overclocks (CPU, GPU, and RAM)

Many competitive players overclock their hardware to eke out every last frame per second (FPS). However, source engines can be infamously conscious unsteady overlocks.

- If the system has an aggressive CPU or GPU overclock used through MSI Afterburner or the BIOS, revert the clock speeds back to factory stock settings to test stability.
- **XMP/EXPO Profiles:** Unstable RAM profiles can trigger unexpected video game crashes and memory checked out errors. Attempt disabling XMP/DOCP in the BIOS momentarily to see if crashes continue.

Running as Administrator

Permissions issues can sometimes avoid the video game from writing essential cache files to the storage drive.

- Find csgo.exe, right-click it, choose **Properties**, go to the **Compatibility** tab, and check **Run this program as an administrator**.

Re-installing the Game

As a last resort, a tidy reinstallation makes sure that no residual conflicting files from old updates remain. Uninstall the game through Steam, by hand delete any staying folders in the steamapps \ common \ Counter-Strike Global Offensive directory site, and download a fresh copy.
