This is the most typical condition in the market. **Well-Worn (WW)** 0.38-- 0.45 Substantial wear; paint is visibly cracked and dull in significant locations. **Battle-Scarred (BS)** 0.45-- 1.00 Heavy wear. The weapon looks greatly weathered, rusted, or damaged. (Note: Some skins look uniquely "cool" or "blackened-out" in high float BS).

It is worth keeping in mind that some skins are hardcoded to never ever appear [real money CS2 gambling](#) in specific conditions. For instance, a specific skin may just exist in Factory New and Minimal Wear conditions.

Rarity Tiers: From Consumer to Covert

Skins are categorized into various rarity tiers, which determine how challenging they are to get through random case drops or trade-ups.

- **Customer Grade (White):** Common, fundamental weapon finishes.
