

Nepean is one of the most enjoyable places in Ottawa for people who want easy access to green space, walking paths, and easy outdoor recreation without leaving the city. As part of the **City of Ottawa**, Nepean sits west and southwest of downtown Ottawa and provides a mix of neighbourhood parks, wooded corridors, and trail systems that connect naturally to the broader landscape. Top outdoor places in Nepean to discover year-round

A single of the most popular open-air destinations in the area is **Bruce Pit**, a popular former excavation site turned restored outdoor area. It is especially appealing for dog walkers and anyone who likes a more rugged feel than a typical urban park. The walking routes around Bruce Pit offer a mix of open views and wooded edges, which makes the area a top choice for people looking for a welcome break from paved neighbourhood streets.

Another strong option is the **Rideau River** corridor, which offers scenic pathways and a more relaxed, water-adjacent setting. While not every stretch sits directly in Nepean, the river pathways are part of the broader nature network that many residents use regularly. The riverfront environment is perfect for walking, cycling, and quiet observation, especially when the weather is mild and trail conditions are good.

Near **Bells Corners**, residents can also find access points and trail links that connect to green corridors and naturalized edges. Bells Corners has long been associated with access to the Greenbelt and nearby outdoor routes, making it a useful starting point for people who want to move from residential streets into a more natural setting without a long drive.



For Nepean residents, year-round use of these spaces depends on season and weather. In spring, thaw and runoff can make some trails muddy. In summer, shade and tree cover help, but so do bugs and warmer conditions. In autumn, the trails can be especially pleasant, though early cold snaps and leaf cover can change footing and visibility. Winter brings its own kind of beauty, with quieter routes and crisp air, but icy patches mean trail safety becomes even more important.

Walking paths, wooded sections, and family-friendly open spaces
