1. Repairing a Sagging Door

- **Step 2:** Open and close the door a couple of times to work the lubricant into the hinge pin.
- **Action 3:** If the squeak continues, tap the hinge pin out using a nail and a hammer, wipe it tidy with a rag, coat it lightly with lubricant, and tap it back into place.

3. Changing Worn Weatherstripping

Drafty doors let conditioned air escape, driving up energy costs. Changing old weatherstripping is a fast, high-impact weekend job.

- **Action 2:** Clean the door jamb completely to remove dirt and old adhesive residue.
- **Step 3:** Measure the sides and top of the door frame and cut the brand-new weatherstripping material to length.
