

Amityville sits on the South Shore of Long Island with the kind of layered identity that rewards a slower look. It is a village with a compact downtown, old waterfront rhythms, commuter convenience, and a name that carries far beyond its borders. Some places become known for one image and never quite escape it. Amityville is more interesting than that.
