## 5. Prize

Numerous players pool their skins into a single pot. The greater the value of the skins a player contributes, the higher their portion opportunity of winning the entire built up pot.

1. **API Integration:** A user logs into a gambling website using their Steam qualifications by means of OpenID.
2. **Deposit:** The player picks items from their Steam stock to deposit. The site's bot sends a trade deal to the user.
