- **Jackpot:** Multiple players deposit skins into a main pot. A winner is drawn randomly; the greater the value of the skins transferred, the greater the statistical possibility of winning.
- **Esports Betting:** Traditional sportsbooks incorporated into gambling sites, permitting users to bet skins or money on professional CS2 matches (ESL, BLAST, Major tournaments).

3. Steam Account Security and Scams

Phishing links, harmful browser extensions, and phony gambling sites regularly target users' Steam credentials. If a player logs into a fraudulent site imitating a popular gambling platform, they risk losing their whole stock to hackers. In Addition, Valve (the developer of CS) frequently punish gambling by banning API keys and bot accounts, which can result in users losing access to funds stored on these platforms.

4. Financial Risk and Addiction

Because the currency is at first deemed "virtual pixels" instead of real money, players often fall into the trap of costs much more than intended. The digital nature of skins makes it emotionally easier to put high-risk bets, potentially causing monetary distress.
