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Families hardly ever start taking a look at assisted living from a calm, leisurely place. Training and scientific oversight

Higher quality culture does not always imply granite countertops. Those are often the locations where your cash buys actual care rather than appearances.

Mapping quality concerns to your budget

Key questions to ask on a tour
