

Introduction

Note: House edge is the portion the operator keeps from the pot. Lower edge typically equates to much better value for gamers, but other factors (withdrawal speed, community trust) likewise matter.

Techniques for Success

- **Bankroll Management**
 - Set a fixed budget per session (e.g., 5% of total bankroll).
 - Stop after losing that quantity; prevent "chasing after" losses.

 - Some cases have a higher percentage of "blue" (common) skins however sometimes yield high-value "red" (uncommon) items.
