1. **Server Seed:** The website generates a random string of characters and hashes it before the game starts. This hash is shown to the gamer.
2. **Customer Seed:** The player's internet browser generates a random seed (or the gamer can input their own).
3. **The Result:** The server seed and customer seed are integrated mathematically to produce the outcome of the game.
4. **Confirmation:** After the game, the unhashed server seed is exposed. Gamers can utilize open-source verification tools to prove that the platform did not modify the outcome mid-game.
