Rates vary based upon supply, demand, and market trends on the Steam Community Market (SCM).

How Case Opening Works

- 1. Get a Case and a Key**-- Cases can be earned through gameplay (dropped after matches) or bought from the SCM. Keys are purchased from the in-game shop or from third-party markets.
- 2. Open the Inventory Menu**-- Navigate to the "Cases" tab in the stock screen.
- 3. Select a Case and a Key**-- Click the case you want to open, then place a matching key.

- 5. Get the Item**-- The skin is contributed to your stock and can be kept, used, or offered.

- **Don't** chase losses by purchasing more type in hopes of "winning back" money.
- **Do not** treat case opening as a financial investment method; the chances are not in your favour.

Tips for Maximising Value

- **Buy cases when they're inexpensive**-- Newer cases tend to be inexpensive at launch, then rise as the supply diminishes.
- **Usage trade-up contracts**-- By combining lower-tier skins, you can possibly acquire a higher-tier skin at a lowered expense.
- **Sell instantly after opening**-- If you're not planning to use the skin, listing it on the SCM immediately can secure existing market value before they dip.

- **Third-Party Marketplaces**-- Sites like Buff.163, Skinport, or DMarket often provide lower charges and faster liquidity, however validate the platform's track record to prevent frauds.
- **Trade-Up Sites**-- Some neighborhoods host "trade-up" services where you can exchange numerous items for an opportunity at a rarer skin, usually for a service charge.
