

Washington, Illinois has a way of surprising people who only know it as a quiet stop east of Peoria. Spend any real time there and the town starts to reveal its character in layers. There is the familiar Midwestern calm, of course, but also a strong sense of continuity, a place where older homes still hold their ground, where church steeples and established neighborhoods shape the skyline, and where new growth has to fit around a community that already knows what it is.
