### 1. Outside Wear Conditions

A skin's outside condition does not degrade through usage; rather, it is randomly appointed when the skin is unboxed or dropped, and it remains fixed permanently. The five official wear conditions are:



- **Factory New (FN):** Pristine condition with little to no noticeable blemishes.

- **Battle-Scarred (BS):** Extreme wear. The weapon often looks battered, rusted, or severely faded, though specific skins actually look appealing in this condition (frequently described as "black-grind" or "battle-scarred gems").

## 2. Weapon Rarities

Skins are categorized into various rarity tiers, which dictate their drop rates in-game or from weapon cases:

| Rarity Tier             | Color Code | Description                                                           |
|-------------------------|------------|-----------------------------------------------------------------------|
| <b>Consumer Grade</b>   | White      | Typical, fundamental weapon surfaces.                                 |
| <b>Industrial Grade</b> | Light Blue | Somewhat uncommon drops.                                              |
| <b>Mil-Spec</b>         | Dark Blue  | Basic tier discovered in many weapon cases.                           |
| <b>Restricted</b>       | Purple     | Higher-tier products, often working as trade-up food.                 |
| <b>Categorized</b>      | Pink       | Unusual, extremely sought-after weapon finishes.                      |
| <b>Covert</b>           | Red        | The greatest standard weapon tier in cases (excluding knives/gloves). |
| <b>Amazing</b>          | Gold       | Exceptionally uncommon products, including Knives and Gloves.         |

## Drift Values and Pattern Indices

Beyond wear conditions, two hidden technical metrics greatly influence a skin's cost: **Float Value** and **Pattern Index**.

- **Float Value:** A decimal number between 0.00 and 1.00 that dictates the exact wear of a skin. For instance, a skin might be "Field-Tested," but if its float is 0.1501, it is ideal on the border of Minimal Wear and will command a higher cost than a Field-Tested skin with a float of 0.37.
- **Pattern Index:** Many skins include procedural generation, implying the texture is mapped differently depending on a seed number (1 to 1000). Famous examples consist of the *Case Hardened* series, where specific seed numbers develop large quantities of blue on the weapon surface area ("Blue Gems"), driving prices up tremendously.

## How to Acquire CS2 Skins

There are numerous main approaches for developing a CS2 inventory, each with its own pros and cons:

1. **In-Game Drops:** Simply using authorities or community servers grants weekly care packages including weapon drops, graffiti, or cases.
2. **Opening Cases:** Players can buy secrets to open weapon cases. While this uses the adventure of possibly unpacking an unusual knife, the chances are greatly stacked versus the gamer.

- **Never click unauthorized login links:** If a website asks you to visit via Steam, verify the URL to ensure it is the main Steam domain.
- **Beware of API Scams:** Do not log into third-party trading websites that need you to produce or share your Steam Web API secret.

- **Usage Steam Guard:** Always have two-factor authentication enabled through the Steam Mobile Authenticator.
- **Research before buying:** Check historical pricing patterns on community databases before purchasing expensive products.
