Beyond exterior wear, skins can likewise possess a **StatTrak™** module (which tracks confirmed eliminates with that specific weapon, marked by a small digital counter) or be designated as **Souvenirs** (dropped during main Valve-sponsored esports tournaments, including gold team and occasion stickers).

The CS2 economy functions much like a real-world stock exchange. Prices are determined totally by supply and demand, rarity, and neighborhood perception.

4. **Float Extremes:** Some collectors pay huge premiums for products with incredibly low float worths (e.g., 0.000 x) or exceptionally high floats where the weapon looks entirely rusted away (referred to as "Blackiimovs" on the AWP Asiimov).

- **Steam Community Market:** Safest for casual users; transactions utilize Steam Wallet funds.
- **Third-Party Marketplaces:** Platforms like Skinport, DMarket, and Buff enable users to buy skins with fiat currency or cryptocurrencies, and often feature cash-out choices.
