Room Name Label Priority: The Most Efficient Way to Label

When it comes to labeling boxes for movers and your own peace of mind, I always recommend this hierarchy:

1. **Room Name Label:** Use bold painter's tape or large block letters on at least two sides of the box stating the destination room, e.g., “KITCHEN,” “MASTER BEDROOM,” or “OFFICE.”

2. **One Line Contents Label:** Optional but helpful for fragile or priority items. For example, “Glassware - handle with care” or “Books - donate pile.” Keep it brief.

Why room names first? Because movers place boxes and furniture directly into their target rooms at your new home, saving you time. I cannot stress enough how irritating it is when boxes come upstairs or into wrong rooms simply because the label was vague or just listed contents like “kitchen gadgets” without a room name.

Common Mistakes to Avoid

- Labeling by item instead of by room. Movers don’t sort boxes by item type; they sort by destination.
- Writing messy, tiny labels on the tops only, which aren’t visible when boxes are stacked.
- Not using color-coded tape or markers to identify rooms—this quick visual cue can speed unloading.

How One Line Contents Labels Can Help Unpacking Faster Tips

Despite the priority on room name labels, adding a one line summary describing the contents can help you unpack smarter, not just faster. Consider the advantages:

- Identify priority boxes (e.g., “URGENT: Toiletries & Daily Essentials”).
- Spot fragile or heavy boxes right away (e.g., “Fragile Glassware”).
- Group similar items logically inside rooms (e.g., “Kids’ books & toys” in the playroom).

The key is to keep these summaries short, clear, and practical so they don’t turn into detailed inventories—that only wastes time.

Non-Allowables and Safety-Based Exclusions: What Movers Won't Take

Before labeling, know what you cannot ship. The FMCSA’s Protect Your Move guides feature essential information about restricted and hazardous items that transit companies will refuse, like:

- Flammables (paints, propane tanks, some cleaning supplies)
- Explosives and fireworks
- Perishable food items
- Live animals and plants

Make a list like I do and tape it inside a kitchen cabinet. Moving day isn’t the time for surprises about banned items. Labeling boxes with flammables is pointless if they won’t go on the truck in the first place—and you could even risk safety violations enforced by the FMCSA.

Truck Parking and Building Access Logistics: The Often Forgotten Essentials

Think about it: I always ask clients one crucial question first: “where will the moving truck park?” before packing one box, confirm truck parking. Without a proper spot close to your entrance or elevator, moving boxes gets exponentially harder.

Coordinate with your moving company (Southside Moving, for example) and building management early. Some condos require advance elevator reservations or have strict time windows for moves. Missing these steps means delays, extra fees, or forcing movers to carry items longer distances.

Tips for Smooth Logistics

- Request elevator bookings as soon as your move date is fixed.
- Verify if any parking permits or street closures are needed.
- Measure large furniture and your entrances to avoid surprises.

Measuring Large Furniture and Exits: Why This Step Saves Headaches

Put these measurements in writing and share with your movers. It helps them plan equipment and identify if dismantling or alternate routes are needed.
