2. Case Selection Tactics

- **High-Volume vs. High-Variance:** Opening lots of low-cost cases (e.g., Prisma or Fracture cases) creates a stable distribution of drops, reducing difference. Opening costly, exceptional cases (e.g., Operation cases) presents extreme volatility where one drop determines the whole match.
- **Case Cost Alignment:** Match the case selection to the preferred danger profile. Low-priced case battles enable longer video gaming sessions, whereas high-roller lobbies can end immediately.

Benefits and Disadvantages of Case Battles
