They flagged the paint and solvents as hazmat, estimated 12 gallons total, and used two choices: the property owner could drop the cans at the county occasion on Saturday morning for free, or the company could manage hazmat transportation for a flat 120 dollars, which covered their charge and the center consumption. They likewise validated they would evacuate the freezer's refrigerant properly and offered the accreditation of their device recycler.

The difference in professionalism was clear. The property owner picked to spend for hazmat handling to conserve time, accepted the firm price, and set up for 9 a.m. Two crew members got here early, prepped doorframes with blankets, and had the garage clear by 10:45. They swept up sawdust, left the functional lumber aside for a neighbor who asked to keep it, and offered donation receipts for the bikes after delivering them to a community repair work program. The invoice matched the price quote. That is the standard to seek.

The environmental mathematics of one truck
