When Facepunch presents brand-new skins to the official Item Store every Thursday, players purchase them straight from Steam at a fixed price. When purchased, these items have a one-week trade restriction. After that week ends, players can trade them with good friends or sell them on the **Steam Community Market** for Steam Wallet funds.

This produces a vibrant market determined by supply and need. Rare skins, stopped items, and those favored by popular content creators can escalate in worth.

Key Factors Influencing Skin Prices

- **Supply:** How many copies of the skin were acquired during its time in the official store. Low-supply items often value in worth.
- **Demand:** Is the skin visually pleasing? Does it offer tactical advantages (like camouflage)?
- **Youtuber/Streamer Hype:** If a prominent *Rust* content developer uses a particular skin set, need for those items often rises.
- **Meta Changes:** If a specific weapon or armor piece becomes greatly favored in the current game meta, skins for that item might see an increase in popularity.

Popular Skin Categories and Tactical Advantages
