Coinflip A 1v1 game where 2 gamers bet skins of equivalent value on a virtual coin toss. Winner takes all (minus a site commission). 50/50 odds, based on a platform rake (fee).
Prize Numerous players contribute skins to a common pool. The greater the worth contributed, the greater the opportunity of winning the whole pot. Probability-based based on relative skin value.

- **Interface and Experience:** A smooth, responsive UI with minimal lag ensures that timed video games (like Crash) register bets properly.
- **Customer Support:** Reliable 24/7 live chat support is important for resolving deposit failures, trade hold concerns, or account inquiries immediately.
