- **Prize:** Multiple gamers throw skins into a typical pot. A lottery-style wheel spins, and the overall worth of the pot is awarded to a single winner, with higher-value products increasing a player's relative share of the wheel.
- **Upgrader:** A risk-based video game where a player chooses a skin they wish to win (worth more than their present skin) and rolls a wheel to see if they effectively upgrade.

Comparing CS2 Gambling Game Types

How Deposits and Withdrawals Work
