Mirror Types: Functional Decisions Impacting Cost & Installation

Shape and Style

Sizing Rules and Lighting Layout for Double Vanity Mirrors

Before you purchase mirrors, nail down the lighting plan to ensure the correct dimensions and spacing. This step prevents crowding and awkward shadowing.

Width and Spacing

- The *National Kitchen & Bath Association (NKBA)* recommends each mirror over a double vanity be roughly the same width as the vanity basin it serves, usually 24 to 30 inches wide per sink.
- A narrow mirror paired with wide vanities causes functional frustration; too wide, and mirrors overlap sconces and ruin balance.
- Leave at least 4 to 6 inches between the mirror edges and any adjacent sconces to avoid glare and blocked lighting.

Height and Placement

- Mirrors should be mounted so the bottom edge is 4 to 6 inches above the backsplash, generally around 40 to 42 inches from the floor in standard bathrooms, assuming 30-36 inch vanity height.
- Centers of sconces flanking the mirror typically sit 65 to 70 inches above the floor, aligning with eye level when standing for optimal task lighting.

Lighting Types: Task vs Ambient

Good mirror lighting is a balance of task and ambient light:

- **Task Lighting:** Focused illumination, typically provided by wall sconces or integrated mirror LEDs, designed to reduce shadows on the face for grooming tasks.
- **Ambient Lighting:** Overall room light that softly fills the space, often complemented by ceiling fixtures or backlighting behind mirrors.

Electrician

- Adds or re-routes electrical feeds to power hardwired LED mirrors or flanking sconces.
- Ensures compliance with local electrical codes including GFCI protection.
- Coordinates wall box placement so lighting switches and outlets align neatly with the vanity layout.

Planning Tips for Successful Double Vanity Mirror Placement

1. **Decide lighting before mirror width.** Select your sconces or integrated LED lighting first to ensure proper spacing and symmetry.
