3. **StatTrak™ Roll:** If the selected skin is qualified, a second roll chooses whether it becomes a **StatTrak™** version (tracks kills) or a standard skin.
4. **Souvenir Flag:** In particular tournament-locked cases, a further check might mark the product as **Souvenir** (originally from a pro-match).

The entire process is server-side and can not be manipulated by the customer, making sure fairness but likewise confirming that each opening is independent of previous outcomes.

Costs fluctuate based on skin rarity, float worth, and market patterns.

Drop Rates and Odds
