Once a skin is removed from the official shop, its supply becomes finite in terms of main sales, shifting the dynamics entirely to the secondary market.

Among the most remarkable aspects of Rust is its robust, Steam-integrated economy. Just like *Counter-Strike 2*, skins hold real-world financial value. Gamers can buy, offer, and trade skins on the Steam Community Market or by means of trustworthy third-party trading sites.
