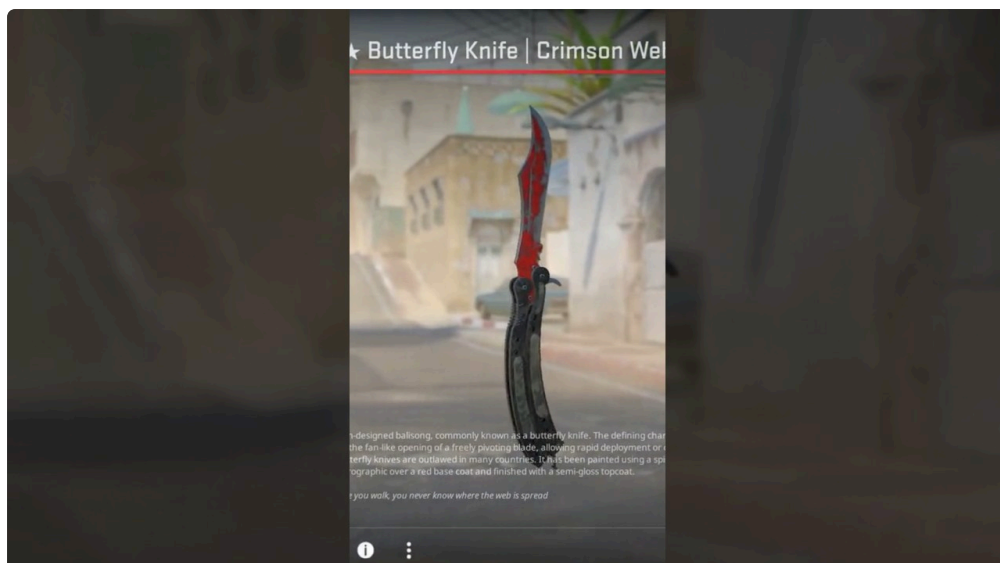


5 The 5 Reasons CSGO Cases Is Actually A Good Thing

: GO Cases: A Deep Dive into the Game's Most Coveted Loot Boxes

Note: Exact odds can differ from case to case; some more recent cases change probabilities slightly to show market need.
