The highest standard tier discovered in cases, featuring iconic designs. Exceptionally Rare (~ 0.64%) **Special (Exceedingly Rare)** Gold Knives and specialized gloves. The holy grail of unboxing. Ultra Rare (~ 0.26%)

Beyond these basic tiers, weapon surfaces likewise include **StatTrak™** technology (which tracks the number of kills made with that particular weapon, marked by a digital counter on the weapon) and **Souvenir** versions (dropped during main esports tournaments).

Wear Conditions and Float Values

A major aspect in a skin's look and price is its **Wear Condition**, frequently referred to as the float value. The float value is a decimal number ranging from **0.00 to 1.00** that figures out how scratched, used, or faded a texture appears.

The five official wear conditions are:

1. **Factory New (FN):** 0.00-- 0.07-- Looks beautiful, though some skins can still have small scratches even at 0.00.
2. **Very Little Wear (MW):** 0.07-- 0.15-- Slight indications of wear, normally small scratches on the publication or edges.
3. **Field-Tested (FT):** 0.15-- 0.38-- Noticeable wear and tear, but the general art work remains undamaged. This is the most typical condition traded.
4. **Well-Worn (WW):** 0.38-- 0.45-- Significant wear, with large parts of the paint scraped away or faded.
5. **Battle-Scarred (BS):** 0.45-- 1.00-- Heavily harmed. Some skins go through enormous visual transformations at this stage, often looking completely rusted or weathered.

Note: Certain skins are "float-capped," meaning they can not exist in specific conditions. For example, a particular skin might be topped at a minimum float of 0.06, making Factory New the only high-tier condition readily available.

The Economics of CS: GO Skins
