5. **Ignition Cylinder Repair and Replacement:** Sometimes keys are lost because they broke off inside the ignition, or the ignition switch itself is used out. Locksmith professionals can extract broken pieces and repair or change the ignition cylinder entirely.
6. **Erase Stolen Keys:** If a key was stolen rather than simply lost, a locksmith can reprogram the car's computer to wipe the memory of the missing out on key, guaranteeing whoever has it can not drive away with the automobile.
