





A healthy lawn in Cape Coral has to handle more than heat, sandy soil, and long rainy stretches. It also has to survive the kind of insect pressure that can flatten a patch of St. Augustine in a week if nobody catches it early. Homeowners here know the pattern. The grass looks fine on Friday, a little stressed on Monday, then suddenly there are irregular brown areas, thinning around the edges, or birds pecking at the turf because grubs or surface pests have moved in.

The pests Cape Coral homeowners run into most often

Not every neighborhood sees the exact same pattern, but several culprits show up repeatedly in Southwest Florida yards.

Chinch bugs are high on that list, especially in St. Augustine lawns exposed to intense sun. They suck fluids from grass blades and inject toxins that create expanding yellow or brown patches. Because the symptoms can resemble drought stress, homeowners often water more, which does nothing to fix the problem and can create other issues.

Sod webworms are another common headache. Their larvae feed on grass blades, often at night, leaving lawns ragged and thinned out. You may notice moths fluttering low over the grass at dusk before the damage becomes obvious.

Mole crickets cause a different type of problem. Their tunneling disrupts roots and creates a spongy feel underfoot. A lawn with heavy mole cricket activity often looks uneven and struggles to hold color even with proper irrigation.

Grubs are less universal than some assume, but when they are present in meaningful numbers they can weaken turf significantly. Wildlife activity is often the giveaway. If raccoons, armadillos, or birds start tearing into sections of the lawn, they may be feeding on larvae below the surface.

Then there are fire ants, which are not just a lawn issue but a real quality-of-life problem. Families with children, dog owners, and anyone who gardens in the yard usually want these addressed quickly. Eco-friendly management here often focuses on targeted mound treatment rather than broad coverage of the whole property.

Why broad-spectrum treatments often disappoint

A lot of residents have tried do-it-yourself products before calling a professional. The story is familiar. A big-box store insecticide knocks things back for a while, then the problem returns. Sometimes it comes back worse. Sometimes the grass never quite recovers.

Once the mowing height was corrected and spot monitoring became routine, the problem stopped dominating the yard.
