Over the years, Valve has actually issued many cease-and-desist letters to popular gambling operators, upgrading its Steam Subscriber Agreement to forbid business use of accounts and shutting down hundreds of automated trade bots.

Despite these efforts, operators regularly adjust by migrating to new domains, utilizing decentralized payment methods, or decoupling their platforms from direct Steam API logins, making total elimination difficult. Additionally, numerous nationwide gambling commissions have scrutinized these websites for offering uncontrolled gambling access to minors, offered the young market of the Counter-Strike player base.
