5. **Valve's Crackdown:** Valve, the designer of Counter-Strike, has repeatedly upgraded its API and trade policies to suppress gambling. Mass bans of trading bots and accounts associated with gambling sites have wiped out countless dollars in digital properties overnight.

How Valve and Regulators Responded

The relationship in between Valve and the skin gambling industry has actually been a continuous video game of cat and mouse.

- **The 2016 Cease-and-Desist Era:** Following a massive class-action claim and public protest over unregulated small gambling, Valve issued formal cease-and-desist letters to dozens of major skin gambling sites, requiring lots of to momentarily close down.
- **Trade Lock Implementations:** To decrease the fast circulation of taken and gambling-bound items, Valve presented a **7-day trade hold** on all traded skins. This meant players might no longer quickly deposit and withdraw products, dealing a significant blow to busy gambling sites.
- **P2P Marketplaces:** In response to API constraints, gambling sites progressed by adopting Peer-to-Peer (P2P) systems, where items are traded directly between gamers instead of through automated website bots.

In spite of these measures, the market adjusted, with numerous sites rotating toward cryptocurrency combination to bypass Steam's trade constraints completely.
