A random ticket is drawn, and the winner takes the entire pot. High (Depends on the portion of the pot owned) **Case Opening** Mimics the official Valve case openings, typically with higher or personalized chances and special reward pools. High (Typically undesirable go back to gamer ratios) **Esports Betting** Wagering skins or cash on professional CS: GO/CS2 matches (e.g., ESL Pro League, Majors) based upon live chances. Skill/Knowledge-dependent (Moderate risk)
