

Newton has a way of surprising people. On a map, it looks like one of Boston's many close-in suburbs, a place to pass through on the Pike or settle into for a quieter commute. Spend a day there, though, and the city starts to feel layered in a way that rewards attention. You notice the village centers, the old homes set back behind mature trees, the parks tucked into residential streets, the independent restaurants that seem to know exactly who they are serving, and the local institutions that carry more history than their modest facades suggest.
